VE COMMEMERATIONS THIS YEAR (& PERHAPS AGAIN IN 2021?)



Over the years the second Saturday in May has been set aside for Branch or Guild meetings so supplemental Marston ringing is rare to be found, but not impossible as we have squeezed in morning ringing such as Saturday 10th May 2003 with an outing to Gloucestershire - Colesbourne, Withington, Chedworth. The cruciform Norman church in Colesbourne (also widely spelled as Colesborne) enjoys one of the most verdant settings in the Cotswolds, nestling within the western edge of Chedworth Wood as it tapers down to the usually pacific River Churn. The Victorian horticulturalist Henry Elwes set out his collection of snowdrops in the grounds here, with over 200 variants now being a sight to behold in late winter. BBC's Songs of Praise featured the church and it's now world renowned snowdrop festival earlier this year.
