#### **Morning Outing to Berkshire**

Of the three towers we took in (Beenham, Shaw and Speen), probably the most interesting would be Speen, which is regarded as being the oldest church in Berkshire, although this is based on its Saxon foundations. St Mary's church was long the mother church of Newbury, and the ringing chamber is accessed via a spiral staircase. The village stands on the route of the Ermin Way which connected Cirencester and Silchester, with lands here being the actual Civil War battlefields of the 2nd Battle of Newbury on 27th October 1644. In view of the time of year it will not come as a surprise that it was on the cold side and the lunch venue, the individualistically named The Bunk Inn, was a cosy haven that was hard to drag ourselves away from.
