Back in the Day
Saturday 13th April 2002

Outing to towers along the River Test

We began our day with ringing at the 12th century Romsey Abbey, the original 10th century building having been burnt down by marauding Vikings. We subsequently wended our way northwards to four towers that are all close to the River Test, the preminent chalk river in Europe and the favourite river in England amongst anglers. The river was at its effulgent best at Mottisfont (our third tower) which is best known for its Augustian priory, now owned by the National Trust. Time was also allocated so that we could also call in at one of the most beautifully situated farm shop/cafes in the country, Kimbridge, - which is accessed via a footbridge spanning a tributary of the Test.
