


MARSTON UPDATE

Understandably for the Update we generally concentrate on the ringing related happenings at the church's in Marston, but the parish also includes Elsfield and its 13th century church dedicated to St Thomas of Canterbury. Undoubtedly the most noted resident of the village was the Scottish diplomat and historian John Buchan, 1st Lord Tweedsmuir, but most widely remembered as being the author of The 39 Steps and other novels featuring the Richard Hannay character. He was lord of the manor in Elsfield and is buried in the churchyard here.

In normal times services are held on the fourth Sunday of the month, morning in the winter months and evening in the summer months. The two bells of the church are what might be described as a Tingtang and for many years Anthony Hughes has rung them for services, occasionally assisted by Judy. (4 photos above and)
